

天文博士のお話 Astronomy Lecture





Fujiwara Teika, a well-known tanka poet in Kamakura era, recorded the observations of supernovae in his diary Meigekki, which is a national treasure. His supernovae records are of importance also for modern astronomy. Reizei House is owned and maintained by his descendants.



Sarugatsuji locates at the north east corner of the Imperial palace. Since north east is the direction of *Kimon* (daemon's gate), it is guarded by a monkey (saru). Why monkey? Ask your guide!

Relics of old Japanese astronomy are kept at Daishogun Hachi shrine, including a celestial globe made by Shibukawa Shunkai(汝川春海), an astronomer in Edo era who made the first "made-in-Japan" calendar.
